WHAT IS ERASMUS?

The Erasmus Programme (European Region Action Scheme for the Mobility of University Students - 1987) is a EU (European Union) student exchange programme. There are more than 4,000 partner universities and 3 million students in the programme. The programme is between 2 - 12 months long. It's a free programme. The most popular countries in the programme are Spain, Germany and France.



student at the University of Copenhagen (UCPH). I'm here with the EU programme Erasmus, and I'm a law student. There are thousands of foreign students at this university. It's a public university in Denmark, and it's the oldest university (1479) and research institution in Denmark. It has got about 20,000 undergraduate students, 17,000 postgraduate students and 3,000 doctoral students. It has got six faculties. These are health and medical sciences, humanities, law, science, social sciences and theology. It has got four campuses in different parts of the city. My campus is away from the city centre. I'm very happy to be here!

University of Granada (UGR)-1531

Universidad de Granada is a public university in Granada, Spain. It has got a history of about 500 years. It has got courses for 75 different subjects in 28 teaching centres. It has got research centres, and it is the supporter of 165 research projects. The university has got 60,000 students. It is a favourite destination for European exchange students. There are more than 4,800 exchange students. In fact, 13% of the students are international students. The UGR has got programmes in arts and humanities, social science, law, engineering and architecture. Many Spanish presidents and artists are graduates of this university.

Charles University (CUNI) - 1848

Charles University in Prague is the first and largest university in the Czech Republic. It is also the best-rated Czech university according to international rankings. It has got 17 faculties. Some of them are law, medicine, pharmacy, arts, science, mathematics and physics. There are courses in English, German, French and Czech for Erasmus students. The university campus is in the city centre.

University of Florence (Unifi) = 1321

The UniFi is a public research university in Florence, Italy. It has got 12 faculties and about 60,000 students. Some of the faculties are agriculture, architecture, arts, economics, education, engineering, law, mathematics, physics, medicine and political science. The campuses are in different parts of the city. For example, the Faculty of Law is near the courthouse, and the Faculty of Medicine is close to the hospital. Many Italian presidents, prime ministers, governors and popes are graduates of the UniFi. The UniFi has got partnerships with 300 universities in 27 different countries.




